


Come Together: Building Community Resilience Through Collaboration

The Long Game: Understanding Long-Range Forecasts for Emergency Management

Emergency Management professionals are highly skilled in responding to short-term weather threats like severe storms and hurricanes. But what about the weather weeks or even months ahead? How can patterns in the ocean and atmosphere today help communities prepare for what's coming next season?

This workshop is designed to bridge the gap between short-term weather operations and long-term preparedness planning. Led by meteorologists from the National Weather Service Tallahassee Forecast Office and the Florida State Climatologist, this session will introduce Emergency Management professionals to the long-range forecast products from the Climate Prediction Center. Participants will gain insight into key atmospheric and oceanic patterns—such as El Niño and the Madden Julian Oscillation—that influence seasonal outlooks and extended forecasts. Presenters will explain how these teleconnections are analyzed to generate long-range predictions and how these tools can support proactive decision-making.

Emerald C Community-Led Disaster Recovery that Leads to Resilience

This applied workshop shows how to convert disruptions into a practical operational playbook for community resilience. Instead of chasing single “root causes,” participants build a condition map across operations, policy, contracts, budgets, and community assets (VOAD/COAD, disability & LEP services, neighborhood groups, universities, and small-business networks). Clint grounds the method in Florida recovery realities—debris, permitting, housing, and volunteer routing—while Alicia equips the room with simple tools: a Recovery

Action Register, a Partner Activation Checklist, and five-metric Outcomes (e.g., debris set-out compliance, permit cycle time, VOAD referral latency, assistance application completion, and near-miss/rumor signal closure rate). Participants leave with a 90-day workplan cycle ready to launch and a Quarterly Outcomes Review agenda that keeps progress visible and shared. The approach is hazard-agnostic and designed to survive leadership turnover—so wins compound into lasting community resilience.

When Data Talks: GIS + PIO for Clear, Crisis-Ready Communication

Public Information Officers are often the public face of an agency during emergencies, responsible for delivering timely, accurate, and clear information. Increasingly, those messages rely on geospatial data – maps, dashboards, and visualizations developed by GIS professionals. This session is designed for Public Information Officers, GIS staff, and emergency management professionals who want to strengthen collaboration and improve how data-driven stories are told.

Using real-world public safety and emergency management examples, this workshop explores where PIO and GIS priorities align – and where they can clash. Participants will discuss common challenges such as unclear mapping requests, misleading visuals, and competing timelines, and learn strategies to avoid them. Guided discussion and activities will help attendees better understand each other's roles and identify opportunities to use maps as effective communication tools rather than just technical products.
